

View From Number 10 A Winter of Discontent

This well-worn phrase comes from the opening lines of Shakespeare's Richard III, and was memorably used in critical comment on the policies of a Labour government some decades ago. How things have come around full circle with a different government in the driving seat at present!

The current cost-of-living crisis and the recent round of New Year speeches find us revisiting these kinds of sentiments. Times are tough and people are unhappy – many resorting to strike action. Wages and pensions cannot keep up with inflation and countless people are severely stretched, with some in desperate straits. We are all having to tighten our belts for a pretty rough ride this year.

Those of us who are reasonably well-placed must be ready to dig deep and support others around us who are struggling. The Foodbank needs constant supplies as do Aspire in Ryde and the various food pantries. We have been offering an open door with a warm space and refreshments for a few weeks now. We have seen a few people venture in, alongside a good number of our own folk who have shown strong support – thanks. Please pray as this slowly develops and finds its pattern, and that local folk in need will find refreshment and support at The Well.

The launch of the new Island CAP centre is very timely. We as a congregation are partnering with four other churches to get this ministry up and running again on the Island after a gap of a few years. There is a service to celebrate this new beginning on Sunday 5th February at Castlehold Baptist Church at 18:30 – with some refreshments to follow. Please come along if you can and do offer lifts to people you know who may want to attend.

There is a biblical mandate to care for the poor in our communities – "There will always be poor people in the land. Therefore I command you to be openhanded toward your fellow Israelites who are poor and needy in your land." (Deuteronomy 15:11). Jesus commented that they will always be there and needing our care.

"The poor you will always have with you, and you can help them any time you want. But you will not always have me. (Mark 14:7).

Let's be very prayerful about our response to the current challenges – not to just moan and groan with everyone else but try to make a positive contribution and make a difference for Christ. We need to be good news people and share what we have with those in need. This is not an optional add-on for super-Christians – it is a very basic expression of our discipleship, The Lord's brother spells this out in his letter – "If one of you says to them, "Go in peace; keep warm and well fed," but does nothing about their physical needs, what good is it? In the same way, faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action, is dead." (James 2:16-17 NIVUK).

May the Lord lead us onwards and inspire our response to the needs around us. And let's remember what Jesus said – "the Kingdom of God is in your midst." (Luke 17:21).

Acts: The Third Missionary Journey

At the end of Chapter 18, we saw Paul embarking on his third and longest missionary journey:

"After spending some time in Antioch, Paul set out from there and travelled from place to place throughout the region of Galatia and Phrygia, strengthening all the disciples." (Acts 18:23)

In chapter 19 Paul once again begins by strengthening the fledgling churches; this time in Cilicia and Galatia, before travelling on to Ephesus.

For reference, I have reproduced a map of this journey (by permission) at the end. Unfortunately, we are not allowed to include this in the online version but you can see the journey on the back cover of the Church Bibles. I do have a copy of the publication which you are welcome to view at any time.

Acts 19: 1-22 Paul in Ephesus

Ephesus was a city of great influence situated on key trading routes, we might call it cosmopolitan. Paul immediately encounters a group of Christians, who like Apollos in the last chapter, have not heard of the Holy Spirit, only having received John's baptism (this partial faith had likely come directly from Apollos, and they were perhaps not Jewish).

Paul quickly sets matters right and they experience a "mini-Pentecost"

"Paul said, 'John's baptism was a baptism of repentance. He told the people to believe in the one coming after him, that is, in Jesus.' On hearing this, they were baptised in the name of the Lord Jesus. When Paul placed his hands on them, the Holy Spirit came on them, and they spoke in tongues and prophesied." (vv 4-6)

Paul spends much time in Ephesus. As usual, he begins in the synagogue, but after opposition, he moves further afield to a gentile lecture hall, and we are told by the end of this period, "that all the Jews and Greeks who lived in the province of Asia heard the word of the Lord. God did extraordinary miracles through Paul" (vv 10b&11)

Luke emphasises the special nature of this time in Paul's ministry.

Next, we encounter some Jews invoking "the name of Jesus who Paul preaches" (v 13) to drive out demons but their attempt backfires, they are unmasked by an evil spirit and the Jews and Greeks of Ephesus are seized with fear, resulting in the name of the Lord Jesus being held in high honour!

"In this way the word of the Lord spread widely and grew in power" (v20)

God Again Uses That Which Is Intended For Evil To Glorify His Name!

Jesus Cannot Be Used To Suit Our Purposes When We Walk With Him Great Things Can Happen

We should be asking ourselves, are we clinging onto things that prevent this and are we confident of our place in God's family?

We Must Be Expectant And Ready For The Power Of God Paul Experienced To Be Experienced Also By Us

As Paul prays in his letter to the Ephesians:

"I pray that the eyes of your heart may be enlightened in order that you may know the hope to which he has called you, the riches of his glorious inheritance in his holy people, and his incomparably great power for us who believe. That power is the same as the mighty strength he exerted when he raised Christ from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly realms" (Ephesians 1:18-20)

It Is All About Christ In Us!

Acts 19: 23-41 The riot in Ephesus

Luke begins by describing this episode as "a great disturbance in the way" (v23) and Brian asked us all to consider if our Christian faith might cause a riot or if is it more likely to cause a coffee morning!

Paul has been in Ephesus for more than 2 years and has generally been well received by the locals, but as is usual in Acts, opposition arises, this time over livelihoods. The people are led to believe that Artemis, their god and focal point of their culture, is being

undermined and a riot ensues, one which we today may recognise more readily from the football terraces!

Conflict Is Inevitable When We Preach God's Economy

"Soon the whole city was in an uproar. The people seized Gaius and Aristarchus, Paul's travelling companions from Macedonia, and all of them rushed into the theatre together." (v29)

The amphitheatre likely held about 25,000 people ~ the scene is chaotic and Paul wants to intervene but is advised to stay out of it.

"Paul wanted to appear before the crowd, but the disciples would not let him. Even some of the officials of the province, friends of Paul, sent him a message begging him not to venture into the theatre. The assembly was in confusion: some were shouting one thing, some another. Most of the people did not even know why they were there." (vv 30-32)

After 2 hours of riotous shouting and chanting a civic leader emerges and is now able to quieten the ugly crowd. He points out that:

- Nothing is at risk ~ the whole world knows who Artemis is.
- No crime has been committed.
- Grievances must be aired through the proper legal channels.
- If this behaviour continues, they will be charged with riot!

His message gets through, the crowds settle and he dismisses them. We see that even when vested interests cause delay to the spread of the word of God,

God Defends His Gospel And His Will Will Be Done!

Going back to Brian's original question ~ how do we ensure that the radical message of Jesus is heard amongst the cacophony of "noise" today?

We Must Keep Our Eyes Focused On Jesus
We Must Speak The Truth In Love
We Must Live The Truth In Our Lives

... and sometimes.

We Must Be Prepared To Rock The Boat!

Acts 20: 1-12 Through Macedonia and Greece, Eutychus raised from the dead at Troas

After nearly 3 years in Ephesus Paul sets out north towards Macedonia; no doubt he wanted to drop in on the churches in Philippi, Thessalonica and Berea. Luke gives little detail of the route but Paul himself gives us clues in his letters. During this period he wrote letters to the church in Corinth and also the book of Romans.

In verse 1 Luke uses the word "disciples" by which he means followers of the way of Jesus Christ. In many ways, this description suits us better than the word "Christian", which tends to mean a follower of "religion" to our world today.

We should also note that in verse 2 Luke uses the Greek word "paraklesis" which is translated as encouragement. This is the same word that Jesus uses to describe the Holy Spirit as "our comforter". Paul is strengthening the believers in any way he can ~ encouragement, comfort, exhortation, consolation ...

Paul then heads south to Greece (Achaia) and almost certainly goes to Corinth, spending 3 months there before returning to Macedonia on his way back to Jerusalem. The party stops for a week in Troas, where something extraordinary happens; Luke sets the scene,

On the first day of the week we came together to break bread. Paul spoke to the people and, because he intended to leave the next day, kept on talking until midnight" (v7)

The first day of the week was Sunday which suggests that these early "disciples of Christ" were already celebrating resurrection day ~ just as Jesus told them to do until His return. We know that Paul can talk and he wanted to impart all he could to them and we should note that Sunday was a working day and therefore Eutychus (whose name means lucky) was probably tired and hungry and the atmosphere was stuffy. Luke tells us, with a touch of comedy, that he fell to his death from the third-floor window seat. Extraordinarily, Paul throws himself on the body and miraculously resuscitates the

dead young man. It seems that Eutychus really was lucky! (although seemingly bizarre, such things took place in the time of Elijah (1 Kings 17) and Elisha (2 Kings 4))

Paul immediately returns to the upstairs room and continues his discourse while they break bread and eat. Speaking until daybreak, he leaves the people greatly comforted.

What can we take from this passage into our walk with Jesus?

Paul was prepared to "dig in":

How Good Are We At Encouraging One Another?

Sometimes Christian worship gets interrupted:

We Must Not Lose Focus, We Must Persevere

· Paul drew from Scripture:

We Must Continue To Feed On The Word Of God, Expectantly

Acts 20: 13-38 Paul's farewell to the Ephesian elders

Paul begins his journey back to Jerusalem by "island hopping" along the coast of western Asia, stopping off at Miletus where he calls the Elders of the Ephesian church to join him.

- He addresses the Elders, and recaps his ministry:
- ➤ He has served the Lord with great humility (v19)
- > He has not hesitated to preach anything that would be helpful to them (v20)
- He calls Jews and Greeks alike to repent and to believe in the Lord (v21)
- He has spoken of the Kingdom ~ proclaiming the whole will of God (vv25&27)

"And now, compelled by the Spirit, I am going to Jerusalem, not knowing what will happen to me there. I only know that in every city the Holy Spirit warns me that prison and hardships are facing me. However, I consider my life worth nothing to me; my only aim is to finish the race and complete the task the Lord Jesus has given me — the task of testifying to the good news of God's grace. Now I know that none of you among whom I have gone about preaching the kingdom will ever see me again. Therefore, I declare to you today that I am innocent of the blood of any of you" (vv 22-26)

Surely they must have been sad at the prospect of never seeing Paul again and he leaves them with a warning:

Savage wolves will come in among you and will not spare the flock. Even from your own number men will arise and distort the truth" (vv29b & 30a)

Paul is speaking about what will happen after he has gone ~ he is speaking to us!

Being A Christian Is A Way Of Life ~ The Way Of Christlikeness!

Paul sets sail into the sunset. In the next chapter, we see both his return to Jerusalem at the end of this third journey and the beginning of his last journey to Rome.

Our visiting speakers are also much appreciated for their insight into scriptural passages.



Open the Book – God's Gift to Schools.

Last year, The Bible Society brought lovely out а booklet called Christmas 'Amazing Days'. The Open the Book teams in The Bay area and Ryde decided to give a copy to each of the 780 children we serve in Godshill, The Bay and Dover Park primary schools. But by November they had sold out! Instead, we were offered other booklets and advised to purchase 800 because the price per copy would be discounted from £2 to 30p.



a booklet to all eleven children then attending Chillerton and Rookley School, which is run by the

same foundation as Godshill.



From 'Amazing Days' we presented the stories of 'The Shepherds' in December. With Roy and Melodie away, we really struggled after Christmas. Bill and Julie, who arrange the assemblies and transport the props and costumes, will be away for a month in the Autumn. How will the team manage then, especially as the others arrive by bus? Then Bob White preached about Gifts on Jan 8th. Bob said that, if God was appointing us to something, He would always provide the resources needed. If the resources are lacking, could this be an indication that what we are doing is not of God, or has accomplished what He intended and it is time to celebrate its completion? Even with assistance from temporary helpers, we were barely able to present 'The Star Watchers'. We decided that.

unless a minimum of three more people (and transportation!) joined

by Easter, The Bay team would have to cease.

In the hall of The Bay School on Jan 10th, more than 400 children, gazed up at us expectantly. Thankfully, one of the gifts the Lord has given Julie is the ability to project her voice. Whist narrating the story, she spoke the lines of Herod in a nasal accent.



Assembly ended. We were clearing away when the support worker of a child who is blind wanted to introduce the child to us. To protect identity, we will call the child Jo. She said that Jo had laughed out loud whenever 'Herod' spoke. Jo then repeatedly asked to hear the voice again, and gave a delighted laugh each time. Claire carried some of the props to Jo. Two of the gifts are in beautifully shaped containers which we encouraged Jo to feel. Jesus was a toddler by



the time the Star Watchers arrived in Bethlehem. Jo joyfully ran hands over the doll's hair, fingers and toes, laughing all the time.

On returning home, we emailed Diane, our contact at The Bay, and asked whether the support worker would have time to read 'Amazing Days' to Jo. If so, we had a copy we could drop off at the school. Diane responded: 'I saw Jo after your assembly and Jo was still laughing about it. That would be fantastic. I am sure Jo would enjoy hearing (the

Christmas stories) again.' We then remembered that The Lion Storyteller Bible, which was chosen when Open the Book began 23 years ago, came with four CDs. They contained all the stories. We played some of them and discovered that the storyteller uses numerous different voices. Into the bag containing 'Amazing Days' we put the CDs and a copy of The Lion Storyteller Bible; a gift to the school. How amazing that Jo, and possibly other children who are visually impaired, may be listening to more than 70 Bible stores. How can we possibly stop?

We decided to contact other congregations in the hope of recruiting more storytellers and Brian agreed for us to present Open the Book during shared worship on 29th January. If you know anyone who might be interested in this ministry, please encourage them to contact any of the team. Children love it, the schools love it, and the Ofsted inspectors who watched an assembly at Dover Park told the Head Teacher they loved it! Training is provided, it's terrific fun, takes up one morning a week and there are no lines to learn.

Thy Kingdom Come ... Pentecost 2nd June 2022 ... (Day 8)

We are continuing to look at Peter's first letter during the devotionals associated with Thy Kingdom Come (2022) ~ a global initiative that invites Christians around the world to pray for more people to come to know Jesus.



These reflections were delivered through a voice recording, try to imagine as you read them that you are listening and responding ...

The overall purpose is to ask God to empower us to become effective witnesses for Jesus each day.

P, pausing to be still ...

R, rejoicing with a Psalm and reflecting on the early church ...

A, asking God to help us and others ...

Y, yielding to His will in our lives, come what may...

Suffering (Phil Togwell)

As I enter prayer now, I pause to be still; to breathe slowly, to recentre my scattered senses upon the presence of God.

Creator God, who formed humanity from dust, breathe in me again. Revive me and sanctify me by the power of Your Spirit. Set my heart on fire with the good news of Your gospel.

I choose to rejoice in God's presence today, joining with the ancient praises of all God's people in the words of Psalm 71:

"In you, LORD, I have taken refuge;
let me never be put to shame.
In your righteousness, rescue me and deliver me;
turn your ear to me and save me.
Be my rock of refuge,
to which I can always go"
(Psalm 71:1-3a)

Today I am continuing to reflect on the Apostle Peter's first letter, which was written to believers living across the region of Asia Minor, who were suffering persecution because of their faith in Jesus.

"For it is better, if it is God's will, to suffer for doing good than for doing evil. For Christ also suffered once for sins, the righteous for the unrighteous, to bring you to God. He was put to death in the body but made alive in the Spirit." (1 Peter 2:9&10)

Archbishop Justin Welby comments on the passage as follows:

"In this passage, Peter places suffering on a whole new, cosmic axis. What God has done for us reverberates around the whole universe, and yet is centred on one beaten, broken man. Later, Peter writes: "You are sharing Christ's sufferings, so that you may be glad and shout for joy when his glory is revealed". Our sufferings are not trivial to the God who intimately knows suffering. But they are not final either. On the other side of suffering is victory. For what took place in Jesus takes place in us – death in the body but being made alive in the Spirit."*

In what ways am I suffering right now?

Father God, I bring my suffering - my struggling, my pain - to You. Where it is ongoing, I ask You for the grace and strength to endure. And help me to remember that suffering is not final, that there is victory on the other side.

Peter's letter was written to believers in the region of Asia Minor, which is roughly what we now know as Turkey. Today, only 0.2% of the population there are Christians, and it isn't easy for them to practise their faith.

Lord Jesus, I pray for my sisters and brothers in Turkey - protect them, and give them strength and courage to share their faith with others.

As I return to the passage, I open my ears to hear Your word, and my heart to yield to Your will once again.

"For it is better, if it is God's will, to suffer for doing good than for doing evil. For Christ also suffered once for sins, the righteous for the unrighteous, to bring you to God. He was put to death in the body but made alive in the Spirit." (1 Peter 2:9&10)

Being a Christian doesn't give me a free pass to avoid suffering or an instant solution to it. It doesn't stop bad things from happening to me. I will feel pain. I will grieve the loss of those I love. I may experience hostility and even violence because of my faith. But I will do none of this alone, says Peter. Christ brings me to the God who suffers, who comforts me, and ultimately delivers me.

Lord Jesus, I surrender my suffering and my struggling to You. I'd much prefer an easier life, but I trust You in the times and the places where things aren't easy. Let Your will be done, and Your kingdom come, in me and through me.

Unconditional Love

As we start a new year let us look at two constants in our walk with Christ ~ namely that God's love for us is the great eternal constant and that nothing is impossible for and with Him. This is what Neil has to say about these things:

The Great Eternal Constant

"See what great love the Father has lavished on us, that we should be called children of God! And that is what we are!" (1 John 3:1)

Have you ever felt that God is ready to give up on you because, instead of walking confidently in faith, you sometimes stumble and fall?

Do you ever fear that there is a limit to God's tolerance of your failure and that you are walking dangerously near that outer barrier or have already crossed it?

I have met a lot of Christians like that. They think that God is upset with them, that He is ready to dump them, or that He has already given up on them because their daily performance is less than perfect. It's true that the walk of faith can sometimes be interrupted by moments of personal unbelief or rebellion, or even satanic deception. It's during those moments when we think that God has surely lost His patience with us and is ready to give up on us. The temptation is to give up, stop walking by faith altogether, slump dejectedly by the side of the road, and wonder, "what's the use?" We feel defeated, God's work for us is suspended, and Satan is elated.

The primary truth you need to know about God for your faith to remain strong is that His love and acceptance are unconditional. When your walk of faith is strong, God loves you. When your walk of faith is weak, God loves you. When you're strong one moment and weak the next, strong one day and weak the next, God loves you. God's love for you is the great eternal constant amid all the inconsistencies of your daily walk

God wants us to do good, of course. The apostle John wrote, "My dear children I write this to you so that you will not sin" (1 John 2:1a)

But John continued by reminding us that God has already made provision for our failure so His love continues constant despite what we do:

"But if anybody does sin, we have an advocate with the Father – Jesus Christ, the Righteous One. He is the atoning sacrifice for our sins, and not only for ours but also for the sins of the whole world" (1 John 2:1b&2)

Lord, by Your Grace, give me strength to overcome my failures; strength to see Your unconditional love in my life and strength to meet the needs of others.

Nothing Is Impossible With God

"I am the Lord's servant, Mary answered. May your word to me be fulfilled. Then the angel left her." (Luke 1:38)

If God wants something done, can it be done? In other words, if God has a goal for your life, can it be blocked, or is its fulfilment uncertain or impossible? I am personally convinced that no goal God has for my life is impossible or uncertain, nor can it be blocked.

Imagine God saying, "I've called you into existence, I've made you My child, and I have something for you to do. I know you won't be able to do it but give it your best shot." That's ludicrous! It's like saying to your child, "I want you to mow the lawn. Unfortunately, the lawn is full of rocks, the mower doesn't work, and there's no gas. But give it your best shot." Even secular scholars say that issuing a command that cannot be obeyed will undermine authority.

God had a staggering goal for a little maiden named Mary. An angel told her that she would bear a son while still a virgin and that her son would be the Saviour of the world. When she inquired about this seemingly impossible feat, the angel simply said:

"For no word from God will ever fail." (Luke 1:37)

You wouldn't give your child a task he couldn't complete, and God doesn't assign to you goals you can't achieve. His goals for you are possible, certain and achievable. When God's will for us appears impossible, let's say with Mary: 'May your word to me be fulfilled.'

Imagine the overwhelming assignment that confronted Mary. She was to have a baby without being with a man. She was to raise the child who would save the world. The entire course of history would be altered, and the eternal destiny of believers would be changed. The fact that today we celebrate Christmas is proof that Mary's child Jesus was indeed the world-changing Son of God.

Despite the staggering nature of the task announced by the angel, Mary gave herself to accomplish God's will. God is still looking for a few willing servants who will dare to believe that nothing is impossible with God.

Lord, I yield to You as Your servant. I choose to believe that whatever You want me to do I can do.





World Watch List 2023 - Where has life got easier and harder for Christians?

Every year, the release of the Open Doors World Watch List shows that Christian persecution has got worse in some countries — while believers in other countries have seen a change for the better. This year, why not ask God to put a country from the World Watch List on your heart to pray for throughout 2023?

<u>Countries Where Persecution Has</u> Got Worse

Overall, persecution has intensified against Christians across the world. The number of Christians facing persecution and discrimination has remained approximately the same –



360 million, which is 1 in 7 Christians worldwide – but the level of persecution has worsened. That only happens because the church is growing and active, and Jesus knew it would happen: "Remember what I told you: 'A servant is not greater than his master.' If they persecuted me, they will persecute you also." (John 15:20). Let's keep praying for our brothers and sisters to be resilient, faithful and even joyful in the face of extraordinary risks, dangers and persecution.

Below are some of the countries that have risen on this year's World Watch List:

North Korea (1)

North Korea is again number one on the World Watch List: the place where Christians face the most persecution for following Jesus. It had been number one since 2002 – last year, even though the nation fell a place, persecution was worse than ever. This year, the persecution score of 98/100 is the highest a country has ever received in 30 years of World Watch List research.

Latin America

The region that has seen the sharpest increase in persecution is Latin America, with four countries rising substantially. Mexico (38, up five places), Colombia (22, up eight places), Cuba (27, up ten places) have all risen, and Nicaragua (50, up 11 places) is in the top 50 for the first time.

Corrupt and ineffective governments, particularly in the rural areas of Mexico and Colombia, have created space for criminal groups and ethnic leaders to grow in influence and persecution.

In Cuba and Nicaragua, repressive governments are intensifying efforts to suppress those they deem opponents to their rule. In Nicaragua, especially, the silencing of Christians has become increasingly apparent, with churches that speak out against injustice and human rights violations by the government viewed as troublemakers.

Comoros (42)

Along with Nicaragua, the other country entering the top 50 is Comoros – which has risen 11 places on the World Watch List. The nation has seen a rise in incidents of violence, and increased pressure from government and in local communities.

Sub-Saharan Africa

Violence against Christians in sub-Saharan Africa has hit new heights as jihadists seek to make Africa the first Islamic continent. This is already having catastrophic consequences for the church.

Countries in this region which have risen on the World Watch List include Nigeria (6, up one place) Mali (17, up seven places), Burkina Faso (23, up nine places), Central African Republic (23, up seven places), Niger (28, up five places), Mozambique (32, up nine places) and Democratic Republic of Congo (37, up three places). The trend of Islamic militant violence in sub-Saharan Africa has been seen over several years, and continues to worsen.

Sudan (10)

Sudan was one of the good news stories a couple of years ago, with steps taken towards religious freedom including the end of apostasy

laws. Sadly, though, Sudan has re-entered the top ten on the World Watch List after dropping out from 2020-2022.

In October 2021, the military effectively conducted a coup that ended the power-sharing agreement with the civilian members of the government. In August 2022. the aovernment transitional established a community police which resembles the disbanded morality police. Power is now firmly held in the hands of the military. Many believe that Sudan will return to the authoritarian years of ousted leader Omar al-Bashir; this could undo the positive steps made towards religious freedom under the transitional government. In general, persecution of Christians has intensified, both in terms of violence and in the pressures they face.

Syria (12)

Syria has risen three places on the World Watch List mainly because of an increase in violence. Last year, three Christians were killed because of their faith and at least five were kidnapped. Dozens of churches, monasteries, Christian cemeteries and other buildings vital to the Christian community were attacked, damaged or looted in the west and northeast of the country, mostly due to intense shelling by Turkish forces, or by criminals.

Countries That Fell on the World Watch List

There are a number of countries which have dropped in the ranks on this year's World Watch List. In some countries this shows a real answer to prayer – sadly, in others, it's not necessarily because levels of persecution have decreased.

Afghanistan (9)

Afghanistan was number one on the World Watch List 2022, and has fallen eight places. This is largely because, in the past year, the Taliban has turned their attention to consolidating power and have not been explicitly targeting non-Muslims. This means there have been fewer violent incidents against Christians that can be clearly linked to their faith. In this complex situation, persecution is affecting almost everyone in many different ways. Sadly, life has not become easier for the small number of Christians who remain in Afghanistan – but it's harder to clearly associate the persecution they experience

with their faith.

Qatar (34)

Qatar fell 16 places on the World Watch list, from number 18. The country has seen a reduction in opposition towards Christians, which is largely due to no churches being closed in 2022. This may be linked to the FIFA World Cup and the spotlight it put on the country's human rights record – and it was also a time when many Christians around the world, including Open Doors supporters, were faithfully praying for our Qatari brothers and sisters.

That said, a significant number of churches closed during the pandemic have not been allowed to reopen, and pressure on Christians – especially converts from Islam to Christianity – remains at an extremely high level. Our church family in Qatar still need our prayers.

Egypt (35)

Egypt has dropped 15 places on the World Watch List, mainly because there have been fewer reports of violence against Christians, including fewer faith-based killings and instances of properties being attacked. While violence against Christians remains high, this is still an encouraging answer to prayer – and we can join in praying that this trend continues.

Sri Lanka (62)

A couple of years ago, Sri Lanka was at number 30 on the World Watch List – because of the Easter church bombings in which more than 250 people were killed. The nation has continued to fall down the World Watch List, and is now outside of the top 50 at number 62. This is an encouraging answer to the prayers of Sri Lankan believers and those who support them.

Every prayer counts

There were smaller drops in position on the World Watch List, and persecution score, for Libya (5), Saudi Arabia (13), Iraq (18), Vietnam (25), Laos (31), Oman (47) and Jordan (49). While these numbers aren't enormous, each change for the better represents answers to prayer – and Christians who were able to follow Jesus a little more freely than the previous

year. We join with believers from these nations in praising God for these changes.

God's church is growing!

Despite persecution, God is still in control – and more and more people are choosing to follow Him. Even in countries where persecution is rife, people are coming to faith and taking extraordinary risks to be Christians. We know that churches that actively share the gospel are often targets for attack and discrimination, but that God has the ultimate victory, and He says, "I will strengthen you and help you; I will uphold you with my righteous right hand" (Isaiah 41:10).

Please Pray

Father God, thank You for loving all Your children so deeply and eternally. We rejoice with those who rejoice and mourn with those who mourn — giving thanks for countries where persecution has eased, and asking for Your help and strength for Christians facing worsening situations. Speak Your words of love to these courageous believers, we pray.

The deadline for submissions is 24th February 2023, and you will be informed by late March whether your prayer(s) will be included. If your prayer is to be used, we will engage with you as follows:

Church bombing, pastor killed and kidnappings: four attacks in sub-Saharan Africa



Four separate attacks in the Democratic Republic of Congo, Nigeria and Burkina Faso demonstrate escalating violence in sub-Saharan Africa. Please pray for all affected.

DRC: At least 17 killed in church bombing

Believers were gathered as normal for their Sunday service on 15th January in Kasindi-Lubirigha, North Kivu province, Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC). During the service, an explosive device was detonated – at least 17 people were killed, and around 20 others were seriously injured.

So-called Islamic State (IS) have claimed responsibility for the bomb attack, according to a report from Reuters, and the military have reported that a Kenyan national has been arrested in connection with the attack. In the aftermath of the attack, Congolese military spokesperson Antony Mualushayi blamed the Allied Democratic Forces (also known as ADF; this rebel group is affiliated with IS).

"Despite the security measures put in place, the first indications

show that it is the ADF which is behind this bomb attack," said Mualushayi. "It is clear that this is a terrorist act perpetrated by the ADF terrorists who have suffered casualties in several battlefields by the armed forces of the Democratic Republic of Congo."

The ADF, which first began as rebel group in Uganda, has been based in the DRC since the late 1990s. The group pledged allegiance to IS in mid-2019. The ADF is suspected of widespread attack on villages in north-eastern DRC, targeting Christian villages, clinics and pastors. Many areas have been emptied of Christians as a result.

"Open Doors condemns this attack in the strongest terms possible and express our deepest sympathies to those affected," says Dorcas Moussi (name changed), an Open Doors spokesperson for Central Africa. "It is horrendous that people who had gathered to worship the Lord were targeted in this way, though sadly, not surprising. For years now the jihadist violence against the mostly Christian population in North Kivu and its surrounding areas in DRC's east have been on the rise, killing thousands and leaving hundreds of thousands trapped in cycles of displacement.

"We call on the government to do all in its power to protect people's freedom to gather and to worship and to ensure that the affected receive relief and rehabilitation. We call on the international community to do all in its power to offer all appropriate support to the government to ensure that there is no repeat of such incidents. We also call on the global church to pray for God's comfort to the bereaved and His provision to His Church in these circumstances."

Nigeria: Church leader murdered and worshippers kidnapped

In two separate Islamic militant attacks in Nigeria, a pastor has been brutally killed while, at another church, a number of worshippers have been kidnapped.

On 15th January, suspected members of Islamic militant group Boko Haram attacked a church in Paikoro, northern Nigeria. They set fire to the parish building – a priest, Isaac Achi, was trapped inside and died in the fire. Another priest, Collins Omeh, managed to escape but was shot, and is being treated in hospital.

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Father Achi was the first indigenous Catholic priest from Gbagyi/ Koro land when he was ordained in 1995. This was not the first time he and his congregations had been victims of attack. At previous parishes, he was the priest of a church bombed by Boko Haram militants on Christmas Day in 2011, an attack in which 44 people died. He also sustained a gunshot wound to his jaw when he went to bless a child during a naming ceremony in 2012 and, the following year, was kidnapped by Boko Haram and rescued by police. Despite the violent persecution he experienced, Father Achi continued to faithfully serve God and Nigerian believers.

Meanwhile, suspected Fulani militants attacked New Life for All Church in Katsina State, also in Nigeria. "The bandits came to the church riding on nine motorcycles and surrounded the church," a source (who wished to remain anonymous) told Vanguard. "Then they started forcing the members out of the church but the pastor tried to prevent them. So, they beat him up and broke his leg before disappearing with the six married women and two single ladies from the church premises." Other reports have suggested that an even larger number of women may have been kidnapped.

Burkina Faso: More than 50 women abducted by suspected jihadists

Suspected jihadists have abducted more than 50 women in two incidents in northern Burkina Faso. According to the Guardian, attackers first seized around 40 women on Thursday 12th January. "The women got together to go and gather leaves and wild fruits in the bush because there is nothing left to eat," one resident told media. "On Thursday evening, when they didn't come back, we thought that their carts had had a problem," another resident said. "But three survivors came back to tell us what happened."

Then, on Friday 13th January, about 20 further women were abducted from another town in the region. "In both groups, some women managed to escape and returned to the village on foot," the local resident added. "We believe that the kidnappers took them to their bases."

Local officials confirmed the abductions but said the army and its civilian auxiliaries have carried out unsuccessful sweeps of the area.

Both attacks took place in the Sahel region of northern Burkina Faso, an area under blockade by jihadist groups and with limited food supplies. The town and surrounding areas are regularly beset by jihadist attacks that often target civilians. It's not yet known if the attacks were religiously motivated – but it is an indication of the vulnerability and risks faced by Christians in the area.

Please Pray

- For God's loving care and healing on all those mourning their loved ones, and those who are scared about future attacks
- For the swift return of all who have been abducted, and speedy recovery for Father Collins
- That the tide of violence in sub-Saharan Africa would be halted and reversed, and for peace to come to the region.

Holy Land's first woman pastor ordained

A seasonal superhero delivered a true Christmas miracle after returning a package of festive gifts to a retired United Reformed

Church minister who dropped them in a river.

The Rev Martin Camroux was walking to Colchester's city centre on 14th December to post Christmas presents to his mother-in-law and do some festive shopping, but disaster struck when he slipped on ice and hit his head while making his way across a Bridge, dropping his gifts into the River Colne in the process.

The gifts, which included photographs, a photo calendar and handmade book, floated away while Martin watched on dejectedly. He thought he would never see them again.

But, the following day he was left dumbstruck when he received a visit from Good Samaritan Sue Hyett, who had retrieved his soggy presents from the river.

"The absolutely wonderful Sue knocked on my door and returned the presents," Martin said. "There was a calendar made by my daughter with a photo of family members on each page, which is slightly damp in one corner, a hand-made notebook sent by my son's family, and some photos of our granddaughter. Someday this will be a sermon story and it will be true. It is a story to restore faith in human goodness."

In the true spirit of Christmas, Sue tracked down Martin after embarking on a mission to find him. She knocked on doors and searched all over social media.

Against the odds, she found the owner of the gifts.



Update

China - Church demolished

Armed police pulled down a church in Wenzhou City in China's Zhejiang province last week, according to our partner ChinaAid.

On the evening of 11th January, the local government of Wenzhou forcibly demolished the Nangang Church without any agreement or compensation plan with the church. Nangang's building and land, which covered an area of eight acres, was worth up to US\$6 million (approximately £4.84 million).

Wenzhou City is home to more than one million Christians – one of the densest concentrations of believers in China.

- That God would protect these recently arrested believers and long

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term prisoners and provide for their needs while using them to share the gospel behind bars

 That Nangang Church would receive more than adequate compensation for the loss of its building and land
