

I am a puppy raiser for Guide Dogs for the Blind. It basically means that I have the joy of caring for a beautiful labrador until he is old enough to go for his proper training to hopefully become a guide dog.

On one of our regular walks, we came across a man who was walking in the woods.

The puppy who is now 10 months old and the size of a large dog, wanted to play with the man. Whilst this is not always appropriate (as people don't always like dogs or become concerned with a dog jumping up at them), on this occasion the man was pleased to play with the puppy.

He went on to say that he used to have a dog and missed him greatly and how dogs can help with your mental health.

I said that I was sorry that he no longer had his beloved companion.

He continued saying that he had needed to leave the dog in China with a friend as he was not able to bring the dog with him, he welled up with tears as he related this story.

He also stated that he lived in rented accommodation and although he was permitted to have a dog he was unable to afford one.

I went on to explain that the puppy belonged to the Guide Dogs for the Blind and I was socialising him and raising him until he was ready for his proper training. I also explained about the Ability Dogs for Young People on the Island and the Cinnamon Trust.

All of these organisations deal with dogs/puppies and if you care for a dog/puppy their food and vets fees are paid for by the organisation and you can volunteer to walk a dog for the Cinnamon Trust for someone who was unable to do so for a variety of reasons. The man thanked me for the information and put details on his phone. He walked away with a spring in his step.

As I walked away, I smiled to myself and was so grateful that I had been guided to walk that particular path at that time. God knows and cares about us all.

A message for Easter 2025

Dear Friends,

As we emerge from the wilderness journey of Lent and stand once again at the empty tomb, we proclaim that God is still in the business of bringing new life out of death. The resurrection was not a return to the past, not a resuscitation of the old, but something completely new. That is the daring promise of Easter - that even when all seems lost, God can and does do something unimaginably new.

The women who came to the tomb expected to care for a broken body. Instead, they encountered a broken world transformed by love and hope. The same Spirit that raised Christ from the grave is still moving in our world today, quietly and courageously bringing life where death seemed to have the final word.

In a world marked by war, division, and deep injustice, it is easy to be overwhelmed by despair. But Easter reminds us that God does not abandon us to the tomb. God is already ahead of us, calling us into new possibilities, new hope, and new beginnings. Resurrection does not ignore the pain of Good Friday: it holds it, honours it, and yet refuses to let it be the end of the story.

In our churches, some of us may feel the weight of decline, the pressure of limited resources, or the grief of what has been lost. But the message of Easter is not to cling to what is dying, but to trust in what God is bringing to birth. This season, may we have the courage to let go where we must - and the eyes to see where resurrection is already unfolding among us.

Let us be people of Easter hope - not wishful thinking, but rooted, resurrection hope. Let us tell the stories of new life in our communities. Let us name the places where God is at work. Let

us celebrate not only what has been, but what is becoming.

May the peace of the risen Christ be with you, and may this Easter season be filled with grace, renewal, and joy.

Spearheaded by Bat Conservation International — a global organisation of scientists and researchers — the day promotes conservation efforts for the species

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2025 sees the 10th anniversary of Thy Kingdom Come, a global ecumenical prayer movement that invites Christians worldwide to pray from Ascension to Pentecost for more people to come to know Jesus.

Since it began in May 2016, God has grown TKC into a movement which unites over a million Christians in prayer (in nearly 90% of countries worldwide, across 85 different denominations and traditions), "so that friends and family, neighbours and colleagues might come to faith in Jesus Christ"

Every person, household and church is encouraged to pray during the 11 days of Thy Kingdom Come in their own way ~ it is hoped that everyone taking part will:

- Deepen their relationship with Jesus Christ
- Pray for 5 friends or family to come to faith in Jesus
- Pray for the empowerment of the Spirit to be effective in our witness

We are praying that the Spirit will inspire and equip us to share the Good News of Jesus Christ with our friends and families, our communities and our networks. It is our prayer that those who have not yet heard the Good News of Jesus Christ and his love for the world will hear it for themselves and respond and follow Him.

We are again invited to join this initiative to pray that God's Spirit might work in the lives of 5 people who have not responded with their 'Yes' to God's call. Whether you have

joined in 'Thy Kingdom Come' before or not, please set aside time each day during this period to take part with us.

The theme for Thy Kingdom Come 2025 is THE LORD'S PRAYER. Both a Prayer Journal to guide you through each day and a Novena, which goes a little deeper, have been produced. Copies of these will be available in the church from mid-May, or you can access them online at:

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Ephesians Chapter 3

(some thoughts on Brian's Bible Bite exposition)

Paul ended Chapter 2 by confirming that there are NO BARRIERS and that we are EQUAL CITIZENS in the Kingdom of God. In Chapter 3 verse 1 Paul begins his theme ... but seems to be distracted (prompted by God?) and instead speaks of his ministry. Verses 2 to 13 expand on this, and he resumes his original thoughts in verse 14.

Paul is clear about his role, given to him by God, to bring the Good News to the Gentiles ~ the mystery which has been revealed to him and which he now passes onto us ~ that we are ALL ONE IN CHRIST. In verses 3 to 6, Paul repeats what he said earlier ... he wants to be sure that the Ephesians (and us) get it!

Jew and Gentile united into one new body in and through the Messiah - Christ Jesus

In verses 10 to 12, Paul explains God's purpose in all this:

"His intent was that now, through the church, the manifold wisdom of God should be made known to the rulers and authorities in the heavenly realms, according to his eternal purpose that he accomplished in Christ Jesus our Lord. In him and through faith in him we may approach God with freedom and confidence"

The writer of Hebrews puts it like this:

"Brothers and sisters, since we have confidence to enter the Most Holy Place by the blood of Jesus, by a new and living way opened for us through the curtain, that is, his body, and since we have a great priest over the house of God, let us draw near to God with a sincere heart and with the full assurance that faith brings, having our hearts sprinkled to cleanse us from a guilty conscience and having our bodies washed with pure water" (Hebrews 10:19-22)

As The Church Of Christ It Is Our Role To Make This Mystery Known To The Whole World

Having confirmed our calling, Paul returns to his original thought in verse 14, he says again, "for this reason".

We might ask what reason? We find the answer in what Paul has

said so far, it is because of God's amazing grace bringing life to those dead in their sins, and the incredible way he has now united Jews and Gentiles through Jesus. So he kneels before the Father and speaks a wonderful prayer over the Ephesians; we see how Paul recognised all three aspects of God's personal nature at work together. He prays to **the Father** - that **Christ** (his Messiah) may dwell in their hearts - and that they'd be strengthened **with power through his Spirit** in their inner being.

"For this reason, I kneel before the Father, from whom every family in heaven and on earth derives its name. I pray that out of his glorious riches he may strengthen you with power through his Spirit in your inner being, so that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith. And I pray that you, being rooted and established in love, may have power, together with all the Lord's holy people, to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ, and to know this love that surpasses knowledge – that you may be filled to the measure of all the fullness of God"

Paul's prayer for the Ephesians (and us) is that we would be:

- Strengthened with power (Dunamis) through his Spirit in our inner being
- · Rooted and established in love
- Have the power to grasp the full extent of Christ's love for us

Paul's ministry was highly effective because it was grounded in his relationship with God and in his prayer life.

Spending Time In The Word And God's Presence Expands Our Horizons

Worship And Prayer Are Cornerstones Of Effective Service To God

The chapter ends with a well-known doxology:

"Now to him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work within us, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, for ever and ever! Amen."

GOD CAN DO MORE THAN WE COULD EVER IMAGINE!

This ends the first half of Paul's letter to the Ephesians; he now turns his thoughts to the more practical aspects of living for God ...

The Fragrance of Jesus

I was walking home after church a few Sundays ago and there was a young couple walking hand in hand a little way ahead of me. I could smell this lovely aroma and wondered if it was some flowers nearby. As I got closer to the couple, I realised it was possibly coming from the girl. I walked behind then for a little way and absolutely loved what I was smelling. I'm not one to normally wear perfume because most smells I'm not keen on but this was lovely. I decided I had to find out what it was so I caught up with them, caught their attention and said, "I know this is a really random question, but I've been walking behind you and I can smell something lovely, do you have some perfume on." She said she did and told me where I could get it from. We had a laugh, I said that I bet you've not been stopped in the road by a random stranger before to ask such a question!!

The following Tuesday evening we were praying in the Zoom prayer meeting and found ourselves praying that the fragrance of Jesus would fill our church and the lives of those who enter it. I remembered my experience a few days before as I walked home from church and it struck me, that is what we should be like as Christians. The fragrance of Jesus should be so evident in our lives that people can't help but come up to us, stop us in our tracks and ask us what it is that they can "smell". Wouldn't that be so exciting if people were coming up to us in the street, in our workplace, in the queue in a shop, on the bus, in our homes, in fact wherever we go, and enquiring about what it is that is different about us, what it is that gives us that hope, that peace, that joy, that patience, that gentleness, that love, that kindness, that self-control in our lives, then we could share with them the difference God has made in our lives and how that free gift can be for them too.

Let's take every opportunity we have to soak in the fragrance of Jesus, whether it's listening to worship music, engaging with the bible, praying on our own or with others, listening to podcasts from other Christians we respect, as we go about our daily lives and lets look forward to those who don't know Jesus yet stopping us and asking what they can "smell". I love the quote by St Francis of Assisi, "Preach the Gospel at all times, and if necessary, use words." Let's let our fragrance do the talking.



The Quiet Revival: Gen Z leads massive rise in church attendance

Church decline in England and Wales has not only stopped, but the Church is growing, as Gen Z leads an exciting turnaround in church attendance.

Church attendance has risen by 50 per cent over the last six years. The findings come in The Quiet Revival, a survey commissioned by Bible Society and conducted by YouGov.

- Over 2 million more people go to church than six years ago
- 16% of 18–24-year-olds are attending church
- More men go to church than women

Dear all

We would like to express our very sincere thanks to all those who responded to our appeal last year for the Presbyterian Church in Myanmar (PCM). The mission team at Church House is enormously moved by this response.

The appeal in total raised £32,000 (164,610,544 kyats).

Since our appeal ended a large area of the country has been devastated by a catastrophic earthquake. This is not a part of the country where the PCM is particularly present, but even so the Church is responding strongly, including working in cooperation with NGOs to provide emergency aid to the victims in Sagaing and Mandalay city and by opening a PCM Centre in Mandalay for affected people to stay at night, including providing water-pumping machines and toiletries

Message from Rev Pek Muan Cuang, General Secretary of the Presbyterian Church in Myanmar:

"We have no words to express our heartfelt thanks to URC. It was so great to receive and see your wonderful work and ministry. I am sure God would use it to make a great significance in the lives of the people of Myanmar and for the members of PCM."

A dream of Jesus in Brunei leads to 30 years of women's ministry

Sara faithfully ministers to the women in her church, helping them to build strong relationships with their spouses. And it's all because of a dream she had when she was 12...

Sara* is not from Brunei, but it's where she grew up. She also didn't come from a Christian home. But there was a mural of Jesus that someone had painted on the walls of a church – a church that Sara would pass every day on her way to and from school. As she passed it, she would slow her steps. One day, she even stopped to sketch the mural.

When she was 12 years old, she had a vivid dream of a man in white. "In my dream, I heard a voice call me 'My child', and I thought, who would call me that?" says Sara. "But when I turned around and looked at that man, I knew He was Jesus.

"He put his arms around my shoulders, and I remember having a conversation with Him. He showed me the family home I grew up in, and then He said something so peculiar. He said, 'I will save them too.' I had no idea what that meant. I was only 12 years old."

When she woke up, Sara rummaged through her things to find the drawing she made of Jesus and was amazed to find that it was the same person.

Ministering to married women

God continued to speak to Sara in dreams. She began attending church and got baptised when she was 17.

The night before her baptism, she had another dream, where she saw a dove. "This time, I felt like the dove brought me out of earth," she says. "I was in outer space, and I saw the earth in front of me. Then I heard a voice saying, 'You do not belong to this earth, I will bring you home to paradise.' During this time, I didn't know much about the Holy Spirit, but that's what God showed me."

Year after year, Sara continued to grow in her faith. She got married – but sadly, it ended in divorce. Her husband did not share her faith

and was unfaithful to her. The pain of the divorce is still strong, but Sara believes that God has a plan and a purpose for her life.

Sara has lived in Brunei for 27 years, continuously serving the people in her church. Despite the tragic ending to her own marriage, she feels called to minister to married women. "I realised there are many women who are struggling in their marriages, and I believe that God has placed me here to help women build strong marriages and strong relationships with their loved ones," she says.

Forgiving is 'a daily choice'

Brunei is currently <u>number 48</u> on Open Doors' World Watch List. The country fully implemented Sharia (Islamic law) in 2019, but it seems to have had little effect on Christians in the country so far.

When local partners met Sara recently, she asked for prayers, saying, "Please continue to pray for me as I make the choice to forgive my ex-husband for all his wrongdoings every day. It really is a daily choice."

Local partners are looking into more opportunities to fellowship and disciple Sara so she can stand firm in her faith in Jesus.

Live Responsibly Today

Whatever "media" we read, watch or listen to today, the world seems full of cares and worries but Scripture calls us not to worry, not to be consumed by worldly fears, nor to be overly concerned about tomorrow... Neil speaks to this ...

"Therefore do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself" (Matthew 6:34a)

Trusting God for tomorrow is a question of our worth. In Matthew 6:26 Jesus says, "Look at the birds of the air; they do not sow or reap or store away in barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not much more valuable than they?" Birds are not created in the image of God. We are! Birds will not inherit the kingdom of God, but we shall. Birds are mortal; mankind is immortal. If God takes care of the birds, so much more will He take care of us. That's why the apostle Paul could write, "And my God will meet all your needs according to the riches of his glory in Christ Jesus" (Philippines 4:19).

Matthew 6:30/31 states: "If that is how God clothes the grass of the field, which is here today and tomorrow is thrown into the fire, will he not much more clothe you – you of little faith? So do not worry ..."

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Exhausting & Exhilarating

What a mix of emotions there are in Holy Week. It begins with the excitement of Palm Sunday. Those who had seen and heard about Lazarus being raised from the dead welcomed Jesus into Jerusalem as 'The Son of David', shouting "Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord."



Our Church commemorated the beginning events with delicious а Maundy meal on Thursday. Between the main course and dessert. we shared in communion.

The disciples must have been bewildered when Jesus declared that the bread was His

body, and the wine was His blood, then invited everyone to eat and drink them.

Good Friday began with a meditation on Christ's sacrifice. We hung ribbons on a cross, symbolising our sins and burdens that Jesus carried in His precious body for us.



This was followed by a Walk of Witness. when Roman soldiers accompanied people taking it in turns to the carry cross Shanklin. around Stopping at various churches. Matthew's of the account crucifixion was read out in dramatic form.

It was, quite literally, excruciating. Whilst we use that word to mean agonising, its exact meaning comes from crucifixion—a form of execution infamous for its prolonged and unbearable pain.



How fitting that, by Sunday morning. we were at Hope bottom of Road. Around 60 from all people The Bav over braved the cold. gathering at 05:45.



As the sun's rays slanted through the clouds (but didn't warm poor Brian's fingers) we sang in exaltation of our Risen Lord.

During our 10:30 service, we continued reading from the Matthew. gospel of We watched Joseph of as Arimathea took the body of Jesus down from the cross and laid it in Joseph's own tomb whilst the two Marys observed. Then the authorities, worried that the

disciples might steal the body, went to Pilate. Pilate ordered two huge soldiers with bulging muscles to seal the rock and guard the tomb. But, when a pint-sized angel flew down and moved the stone, the knees of those imposing soldiers shook, and they fainted.

The angel told the women that Jesus had risen. He invited them to look inside the tomb, where they discovered only the grave clothes. Then he sent them to tell the disciples to meet Jesus in Galilee, but, before they got very far, Jesus Himself appeared to the women. Could anything exceed the joy of the morning?

Having woken around 04:30 was no excuse - many of us were back on the beach at 17:00. Jade and 15 year old Madisyn were to be

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baptised, and learn the truth of God's promise that "when you pass through the waters, I will be with you."

Violence in Schools

Presenting sad or serious Bible stories during assembly to children as young as 5 is difficult. This time of year is particularly challenging. The children have heard about Jesus for many months, hopefully they have grown to love Him. Now, to see him violently killed, could devastate them. The Last Supper is sombre, with lots of



explanation. We had to say that the bread and wine 'represented' the body and blood of Jesus to prevent them taking it literally.



The story started with Peter and John being sent to follow a man carrying a water jar. We asked the teacher to provide 4 girls, all of whom were given costumes and water jars. We were delighted to see that one of those chosen was Eileen's granddaughter. In the time of Jesus, it was women who fetched water, and the girls milled around in the marketplace, chatting to each other. This meant that the disciples had to search for the man who was at the back of the scene.



The script ended on a sombre note. Judas, seen in the photo having his feet washed, left to betray Jesus. Before the others set off into the night, they sang a hymn. Here was the opportunity to finish with something positive. The storyteller who had been playing the part of 'Judas' removed her costume and, together with Julie, danced a

hora to the words of 'Evenu Shalom Alechem' – 'We come bringing you peace'. The children loved it, as many of them told us afterwards.



The following week was completely different to anything else we do. No children were involved in 'The Soldier's Story', which began with the warning: 'it begins really sadly, but don't worry, it has a brilliant ending'.

The trial and crucifixion were presented in silhouette, whilst the soldier looked on from the front.




The children gasped in horror as Jesus was hit, nailed to the cross, and laid in the tomb. This was done from behind the curtain, so that the children could

see the body being pushed in, then Joseph of Arimathea came round the front to roll the stone into place.

The body, now out of sight, was removed, leaving the tomb empty. When the angel came out to roll the stone away, another soldier ran away terrified, dropping the banner to the floor.

This lightened the mood for the watching children,



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especially when a mannequin, lit up as an angel, moved around inside the formerly empty tomb.

The angel asked Mary Magdalene why she was crying, then she turned round. Seeing someone else in the garden, Mary thought it was the gardener, until Jesus

called her name.



When Mary went off to tell the disciples that Jesus had risen, the soldier believed that Jesus really was the Son of God. The cheers from the children reassured us that, far from being traumatised by the story, they were reassured and happy.

As you can imagine, setting up the scenery and rehearsing in the school takes a long time, so we do this the previous day after the children have left. It provides the perfect



opportunity to film the rehearsal. At Dover Park, one class was unable to attend the assembly. The Headteacher asked for the video of the rehearsal to be sent to him so it could be shown to those who had missed it. Haylands, Year 6 had attending not been assemblies for several weeks. Apparently the time is being used to prepare them for their SATS exams, but they were all there for 'The Soldier's Story'. The teacher in charge emphasised that this is the most important story in the Bible and what Easter is all about.

We are the only Christian organisation that is allowed to enter the festival site and assist with welfare and safeguarding issues.

To help support the Isle of Wight Street Pastors a national call has gone out to mainland initiatives for street pastor volunteers to come help us which has had a great response so far- prayer needed. Due to mainland Street Pastors coming over, we are also looking for accommodation. If you have a spare bedroom and are able to accommodate a Street Pastor, please let us know.

Whilst on patrol, Street Pastors will talk to people they meet, giving out Lollipops and chocolates to show God's love in action or to act as an icebreaker to start a conversation. They may also use lollipops

in reaction to a volatile or difficult situation where someone is in need of help or distraction.

We may respond to someone:

- Suffering the effects of having a lot to drink or taking other substances
- Being separated from their friends, or need help to get home,
- Or when there is some argument or altercation brewing.

Street Pastors cannot interrupt an ongoing fight- although they can call the police- but they can certainly avoid one starting.

As they patrol, Street Pastors pick up glass bottles and broken glass that might otherwise cause an injury or be used as a weapon. They give out flip flops to women who have found their high heels are no longer bearable after being on them for a while. Street Pastors also give out foil blankets to people who may be cold from not wearing the right clothing for the weather, saving them from hypothermia. Most patrols also involve helping people home, whether that's directing them to a bus station, taxis or ringing a friend or family member to pick them up

Basically Street Pastors are simply there to care, listen and help in the name of Jesus.

This is a fantastic opportunity to show potentially thousands of people the love of Jesus.

Setting free the hearts of prisoners

"Prison bars don't keep God out." Rev Tim Wright, chaplain at HMP Stocken.

Prisoners in England and Wales are coming to faith in Jesus. Support for the Bible Society is putting the Bible into their hands and growing their confidence in its healing power.

That means as a supporter you're a key part of a Bible Society ministry that goes back to the beginning. In the early 1800s, Bible Society supporter and prison reformer Elizabeth Fry worked tirelessly to improve the lives of inmates. Today, you are getting more and more Bibles to prisoners and giving them a second chance, with Jesus.

"Prisoners are drowning, spiritually and morally," said Rev Tim. "The waves are high and their heads are going under. But the Bible gives guidance, purpose and direction. Thank you. You are changing the lives of prisoners in remarkable ways."

Prisoners hunger for God

If you walked through the grey, featureless corridors of HMP Stocken, the sound of worship would meet you long before you arrived at the chapel. Deep, powerful and heartfelt, the voices of 60 men sing the worship song 'How Great is our God' – and the music echoes around the prison walls.

In the chapel itself, every seat is taken. Prison chaplain, Rev Tim Wright, opens God's word and waits while everyone picks up their Bible and finds the right page. "Follow along, because God has something to say to you," Rev Tim tells the prisoners, and you can hear a pin drop as he begins to speak.

This is the extraordinary picture of faith behind bars. In prisons right across England and Wales, chaplains say the Lord is at work and lives are being changed. And the amazing thing is, you are part of it – because your support is not only putting Bibles into these prisoners' hands, but helping them engage with it.

"There's a real hunger and thirst from the men," says Rev Tim. "Imagine hosting a Bible study at your house, opening the door and

seeing 30 people standing there. That's happening in prison! I'm having to put men on the waiting list for Bible study groups."

Providing life-changing Bible resources

Support for the Bible Society has delivered hundreds of Bibles to HMP Stocken, so every prisoner who attends Bible study receives a copy of their own. Rev Tim has also run *The Bible Course* three times.

But it's not enough. Even though the Bible Society helped provide more than 6,500 Bibles to 122 prisons in the last year, demand still outstrips supply. Chantelle Baker, who leads Bible Society's prisons ministry, said, "A prison chaplain might ask for 100 Bibles, but our budget means the most we can supply is half that, sometimes even less. I'd love to be able to provide more prisoners with Bibles."

Prison chaplains are often in touch to ask for ways to help prisoners engage more fully with their Bibles, whether that is starting *The Bible Course*: Prisons Edition, or using helpful Bible study materials. A way in, and a guide through, makes all the difference to someone's deeper understanding of the message of Scripture.

Chantelle added, 'My heart is to see prisoners reading the Bible and growing in the understanding of what it means for them, so that their lives are transformed and they share their faith with others.'

"Vulnerable and unprotected" – Christian converts in Bangladesh attacked amidst rising persecution

Please pray for Barun, his mother, and Akram – three Christian converts who were recently attacked and hospitalised.

In Bangladesh, a Muslim-majority country, Christians make up only 0.5% of the total population. Converts from both Hindu and Muslim backgrounds experience the brunt of persecution, as these two recent attacks show.

Barun* (13) is a Christian from a Hindu background. He lives in a small house along with his widowed mother and two younger brothers in the northern part of Bangladesh. The village is mostly occupied by other converts from Hinduism, but they're surrounded by a Muslim community who are angry that these believers didn't convert to Islam. The Christians are frequently harassed, with demands to leave and threats of forced eviction from the village.

After the local pastor visited Barun's village on 31 March, a group of local Muslims went to the village. They began questioning Barun and his mother, insulting and mocking them in various ways.

"Why have you converted to Christianity?" they demanded. "Why not to Islam? You are living in a Muslim country, but you have converted into Christianity. You can't do that here! We won't allow you!"

As tensions escalated, the group began threatening Barun's family, saying, "You can't stay here! This is a Muslim country. Go live in a Christian country – we will kick you out of this village!"

Barun taken to hospital after attack

When the perpetrators started to insult his mother and push her, Barun tried to defend her. But the group turned on him instead and violently beat him, knocking him on the ground. The extent of Barun's injuries from this attack meant he had to go to hospital for treatment.

Barun's mother was shaken after the incident. "We are poor, and we do not have a place to go – that's why these people can easily persecute us," she says. "We do not create any problems for them, but still, they are making trouble for us. We have no business with them. Without any reason, we are being persecuted."

The local pastor says, "These people have been persecuted for long time. Recently, some miscreant tried to set this village on fire during the night. They ignited a haystack near one of the believer's homes, but fortunately someone saw the flames in time and quickly extinguished before it spread. Sadly, these people remain vulnerable and unprotected."

Open Doors local partners are helping Barun's mother with emergency needs and hospital expenses. They have also been praying and encouraging Barun and his mother not to lose heart but to hold on to hope, continually seeking and praying to the Lord.

Young boys attack an elderly man

Just over a week earlier, on 22 March, Akram* – a believer from a Muslim background living in western Bangladesh – was attacked by some Muslim boys while working in a maize field.

Akram, an elderly man and local house church leader, was in the middle of the field tending the maize plants. While he was busily working, he didn't notice a group of young Muslim boys approach and surround him. They began interrogating him, intentionally trying to find something to accuse him of. Failing to find anything, the boys started claiming that Akram was converting people and leading young Muslims to hell.

When Akram denied all their accusations, they became furious and attacked him, taking turns to beat, kick and punch him. They also used sticks and weapons. Akram eventually lost consciousness and

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his leg in particular was severely injured.

Some other farmers working in the same field saw the commotion from afar and quickly rushed to Akram while the boys ran away. They took him to the local hospital for treatment.

"I know I will not get justice"

When asked whether he wanted to file a case against the boys, he said, "I will not file any case against them because I know I will not get justice. After filing a case against them, I will suffer much. I do not blame them either, but I forgive them."

He added, "My Lord Jesus Christ was persecuted the same way. He was beaten. He shed blood on the ground but still He forgave them and prayed for the persecutors. I forgive them and I pray that God will forgive them and will help them to find the truth and find salvation."

Bangladesh has risen three places to number 24 on the World Watch List this year as persecution has increased. More Christians from Muslim backgrounds are being targeted — even by Muslim neighbours and friends who they've known for years.


