A Warm Welcome

Part of the **Leading your Church into Growth** initiative that we've been exploring involves a challenge to carefully examine the nature of our welcome. There is much we can take for granted about our church building and the way we do things – the culture that most of us don't even notice because it is all so familiar.

But what does all this look like for someone who has been passing the door and trying to summon up the courage to come in? What do our noticeboards communicate – what is the entrance area like; is it all attractive and exuding a message of welcome and warmth?

So often our noticeboards can be tatty, cluttered and sometimes out of date and stuff gets left lying around the place sometimes for years not just months. We must try to make our premises as homely as possible and make sure that the things left out are there for a good reason and that the key pieces of communication are most prominent.

In his recent paper about Missional Trends, Phil Knox of the Evangelical Alliance urges us to have our eyes and hearts open in what seems to be a ripe season when people in the UK are interested in finding out about faith in Jesus:

“Are we ready to welcome people who are searching? Are we prepared to connect with people who walk through our doors?

People come to church for many reasons, but they will stay because of relationship. In this season, as people encounter Jesus and search for truth, are our communities of faith ready to journey with people towards the way, the truth and the life?”

As we explore ways in which we can grow as a church - in number, in spiritual depth, and in missional breadth - we must look carefully at how we can better offer a warm and genuine welcome to those who venture through the doors. In both congregations I lead we have seen new faces and people showing interest in the faith. Making

friendships and getting involved in community life are keys to those folk feeling at home and getting more deeply involved.

Please let's not take anything for granted – let's be alert to the needs of new people in our community and do all we can to help them feel at home and begin to belong. Often it seems that for many folk belonging comes before believing.

I find it hard to believe that it's 12 years now since I was inducted as minister for the IoW URC Group and became pastor of the congregation at Ryde (and Freshwater for several years until they sadly closed). We have journeyed on as partner churches and I thank you all for the way you have supported me as I have sought to serve our friends 8 miles to the north. May we continue to have a Kingdom mindset and invest in God's work across the Island and beyond. We can make others at a distance and watching online feel valued and even welcomed because of our love and attitudes shown in action.

May the Lord richly bless us in this new season of opportunity.

New Year message 2026

Dear Friends,

As the year turns, I want to begin with something simple and sincere: thank you. Thank you for the faithfulness that is so often unseen, for the steadiness that keeps going when enthusiasm is in short supply, and for the care you offer in ways that rarely make headlines or reports. Over the Christmas season especially, many of you carried extra responsibilities with grace, even when energy was limited. Your presence, patience, and quiet perseverance matter more than you may realise.

The arrival of a new year can stir a wide range of emotions. For some, it brings relief; for others, apprehension; for many, a mixture of both. Not every year ends neatly, and not every story reaches a satisfying pause at midnight on 31st December. If the year just past has left you tired, uncertain, or simply glad it is over, you are not alone, and you are not failing. Faithfulness is not always loud or productive. Sometimes it looks like staying, listening, and beginning again gently.

January often arrives carrying expectations it cannot possibly meet, forcing us to feel as if we need to reset, reinvent, and improve ourselves at speed. Yet the gospel offers a different rhythm. We are not required to become someone else in order to be valued by God. We are invited instead to live more truthfully, more attentively, and more kindly, to ourselves as well as to one another.

That is why, as we begin 2026, I want to commend once again the spirit of Gentle January, not as a programme but simply as a permission. Permission to ease into the year rather than rush it. Permission to notice what sustains rather than what exhausts. Permission to set aside unnecessary urgency. Gentleness can take many forms:

- a softer pace,

- a kinder inner voice,
- more spacious expectations,
- time to breathe, pray, and reflect,
- and a renewed attentiveness to the people and places entrusted to our care.

None of this is about doing less for the sake of it. It is about grounding what we do in grace rather than strain, and allowing God's faithfulness, not our own effort, to be the firm ground beneath us.

As this new year unfolds, my hope is that you will know moments of rest, clarity, and quiet joy, and that you will feel encouraged rather than driven. May 2026 be a year in which you are gently held, and gently renewed.

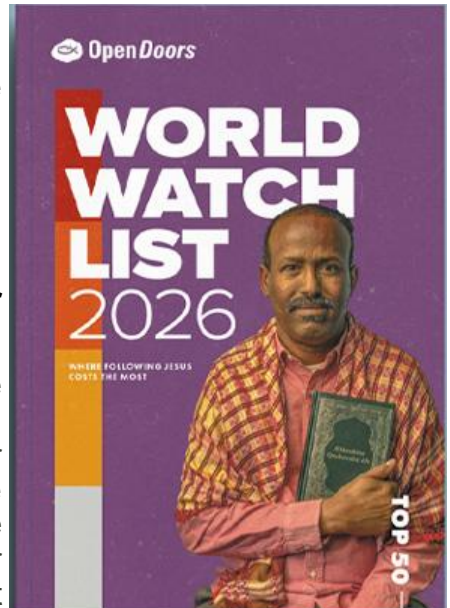
World Watch List 2026

The new World Watch List will be arriving in print around mid-February, but is available online at the Open Doors website.

In brief

4,849 pay ultimate cost for their faith

Open Doors research shows that the number of Christians worldwide killed for their faith increased by eight per cent to 4,849. Of these, 72% were from Nigeria – that's more than the rest of the world combined. Other countries in sub-Saharan Africa that recorded at least 100 faith-related killings include Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC), Burkina Faso and Cameroon.



Syria jumps 12 places, making it the biggest riser

Syria has jumped to sixth. It's the biggest riser in this year's list and now a place of extreme persecution for many of the country's tiny minority of believers. This is largely down to a sharp rise in the number of Christians killed and churches attacked since the fall of the Assad regime, notably the suicide bomb at Saint Elias Church, Damascus, in June that killed 22 people.

Drop in violence in Bangladesh

Among the good news from the latest list is a 20% drop in reported incidents of violence in Bangladesh. Since the ousting of Prime Minister Sheikh Hasana in August 2024, a period of relative calm has emerged under the interim leadership of Muhammad Yunus, an advocate of religious freedom. However, with elections scheduled for early this year, this will be tested, with concerns that it could lead to greater persecution of religious minorities.

Trends

Heightened hostility in Syria

The persecution facing Syria's (No. 6) embattled and dwindling Christian minority has heightened over the past year, with the country recording the largest single-year increase in score on the World Watch List since 2014.

This dramatic rise is largely attributed to a surge in violence. During the reporting period, at least 27 believers were reported to be killed for their faith, but the true number is likely to be higher. In the previous 12 months, the number was zero. Attacks on churches and forced closure of Christian schools have also increased.

The fall of the Assad regime in December 2024 was a seismic moment in Syria's history. Among Christians, there was cautious hope that it would represent a turning point after more than a decade of persecution and conflict. However, under the rule of the Islamist group Hay'at Tahrir al-Sham (HTS), despite some economic improvement, political power remains fragmented and widespread disorder is playing into the hands of militants. Meanwhile, pressure from wider society to conform to Islamic ideals and practices has grown.

It's deeply added to the fears and unease of our family in Syria. Many have stopped attending church, whilst churches have had to curtail their activities. There are believed to be 300,000 Christians in Syria today – hundreds of thousands fewer than ten years ago. For the remnant, the hope of better days feels as fragile as ever.

Instability and insurgency in sub-Saharan Africa

The intensifying persecution facing Christians in sub-Saharan Africa has become a theme of the World Watch List over recent years and this year is no different, with weak governance, institutional failure and lawless regions among the key factors exposing believers to rising hostility.

Five of the 14 countries on the World Watch List that are in sub-Saharan Africa have experienced coups in the past five years – that's Niger (No. 26), Mali (No. 15), Burkina Faso (No. 16), Central African Republic (CAR) (No. 22) and Sudan (No. 4). Meanwhile, armed conflicts plague several countries, including the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) (No. 29) and Mozambique (No. 39), as well as Sudan (No. 4), up one place on the World Watch List as Christians are targeted by both sides of its civil war.

One of the effects of regional instability is the rising influence of Islamist groups, with Christians often disproportionately targeted. In Mozambique (No. 39), five Christians were beheaded by a group with links to so-called Islamic State (IS), and 38 people were killed during a prayer vigil in one of several devastating attacks by the Allied Democratic Forces (ADF) in eastern DRC (No. 29). In Nigeria (No. 7), the epicentre of deadly violence against Christians in the region, 258 were killed when Fulani militants attacked a Christian farming community in Benue State in June.

In recent months, the world has begun to talk more about the suffering of Christians in sub-Saharan Africa, particularly Nigeria. It's a very welcome development but, as the latest World Watch List report shows, the need is enormous – and that's why Open Doors' Arise Africa campaign remains crucial in raising awareness, support and prayer, including through a petition aimed at raising one million signatures.

Driven to isolation

You might be familiar with the smash and squeeze of persecution. The former reflects the overt targeting of Christians, such as violence, whilst the latter is a more subtle approach aimed at suffocating believers through tactics including surveillance and tight regulations.

Algeria (No. 20) is one country where the squeeze of persecution has been particularly pronounced in recent years. Since 2021, opposition has jumped markedly, largely because of an increase in pressure by the authorities. In December 2024, the Algerian government shut down a Christian Facebook group with more than 50,000 followers. They've also kept previously closed churches shut and ordered others to cease activities. It's now believed that 75% of Christians in Algeria no longer have a place to gather for worship, leaving many isolated in their faith.

It's a similar story elsewhere, including in nearby Tunisia (No. 31), where the country's authoritarian leadership has heightened its surveillance of Christians. For those already forced to keep their faith secret because of pressure from family and their community, this troubling trend has only added to many believers' isolation.

And in China (No. 17), a renewed crackdown on church activities, including the arrest of believers, followed the introduction of new regulations governing online religious activity in September 2025. The

pressure to align with Communist ideology is ramping up, further suffocating believers' freedoms and pushing them into the shadows.

What's the good news?

Alongside the good news from Bangladesh (No. 33), where there has been a reduction in reported attacks on Christians, there are other countries where there have been positive developments.

In Mexico (No. 30) and Colombia (No. 47), there is growing recognition – from media, civil society and some state actors – of the specific risks faced by religious leaders in areas affected by organised crime and armed groups. A spotlight is also being shone on the authorities' approach to religious freedom in Cuba (No. 24) and Nicaragua (No. 32), through the work of international monitoring groups and advocates speaking up on behalf of affected churches and leaders.

And in a wonderful answer to prayer from Malaysia (No. 51), truth and justice prevailed with Susanna Koh winning her court case against the state over the disappearance of her husband, Pastor Raymond Koh, in February 2017.

God of the impossible

These trends are a reminder that the drivers behind the persecution of brothers and sisters are complex and multifaceted. But perhaps the most potent and powerful reason for persecution is that, in all these countries, the church is still present and alive. In many places, it's even growing!

Despite the best efforts of dictators, extremists, secret policemen and party officials, Christians continue to show remarkable resilience and creativity in how they witness to Jesus. Churches still meet, prayers are prayed, Scripture is shared and the gospel is still proclaimed. The enemies of Christianity will always try to make life impossible for Christians. But it won't work. Because ours is an impossible faith. And nothing is impossible with God.

Who Shall Be Our Guide?

Ignoring the Enemy and Choosing The Truth

“For we do not have a high priest who is unable to feel sympathy for our weaknesses, but we have one who has been tempted in every way, just as we are – yet he did not sin.” (Hebrews 4:15)

“Submit yourselves, then, to God. Resist the devil, and he will flee from you” (James 4:7)

There are three ways of responding to the demonic taunts and barbs being thrown at you during your daily walk with Christ, and two of these ways are wrong!

First, the most defeated people are those who consider demonic thoughts and believe them. A subtle thought is shot into your mind: "You don't pray, read your Bible, or witness as you should. How could God love you?" That's a bald-faced lie because God's love is unconditional. But you start thinking about your failures and agreeing that you're probably not very lovable to God.

The second response is just as unproductive. You try to argue with the demons: "I am not ugly or stupid. I am a victorious Christian." You're proud that you don't believe what they say, but they're still controlling you and setting your agenda. You're standing in the middle of the street shouting at them when you should be marching forward.

The third, and correct way, is to ignore them and choose the truth. You're equipped with the armour of God; they can't touch you unless you drop your guard. With every arrow of temptation, accusation, or deception they shoot at you, simply raise the shield of faith, deflect

the attack, and walk on. The way to defeat the lie is by choosing the truth.

“We demolish arguments and every pretension that sets itself up against the knowledge of God, and we take captive every thought to make it obedient to Christ” (2 Corinthians 10:5)

“Stand firm then, with the belt of truth buckled round your waist” (Ephesians 6:14)

People in bondage are not liberated by what I do as the pastor, but by what they do with my help. As a pastor, it's not what I believe that breaks the bonds; it's what those in bondage believe, confess, renounce, and forgive.

Notice the progressive logic of Scripture:

“Then you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free” (John 8:32)

“I am the way, and the truth, and the life” (John 14:6)

“The Spirit of truth will guide you into all the truth” (John 16:13)

“My prayer is not that you take them out of the world but that you protect them from the evil one. Sanctify them by the truth, your word is truth” (John 17:15,17)

“Brothers and sisters, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable – if anything is excellent or praiseworthy – think about such things” (Philippians 4:8)

When Satan harasses you, you may be prone to languish in the shadows of your misery. You may cry out for God to deliver you, like Jesus miraculously and instantaneously delivered the demonised people in the Gospels. But when you read through the Epistles, it is obvious that **your deliverance has already been accomplished in Christ's work on the cross and His resurrection**. Since you are with Christ in the light, you never again need to live in the shadows.

You must choose the truth and assume your responsibility to exercise your authority and resist the devil. From your position in Christ, you must resist the devil, renounce participation in his schemes, confess sin and forgive those who have offended you.

In the face of the lies the enemy throws at me today,

Lord, I choose and embrace Your truth, which gives me life and leads me in the everlasting way. I embrace your truth to direct my steps today.

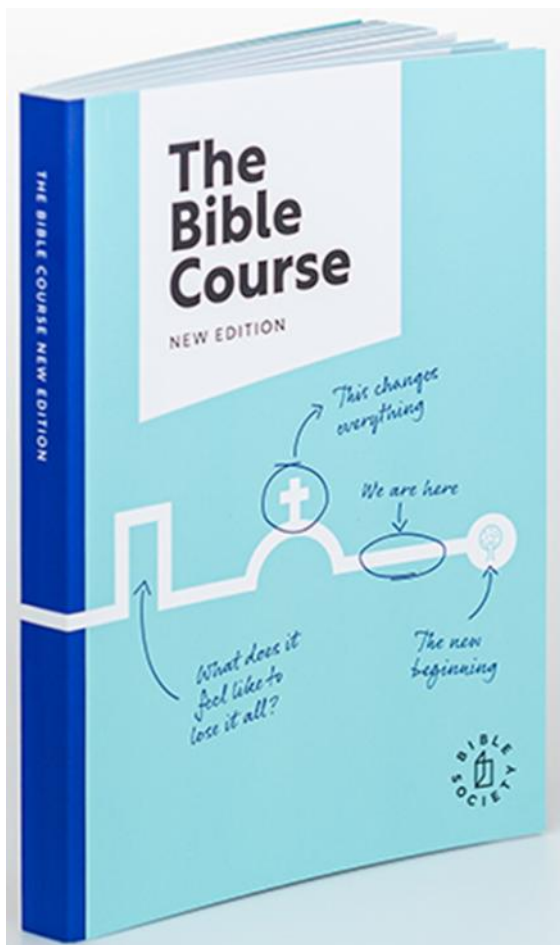

IoW Street Pastors IoW Festival 2026



Street Pastors will be patrolling again at the IoW Festival in June.

As well as patrolling on foot off site and on site at the festival we are also opening our Safe Space in Newport Bus Station and our Festival Safe Space gazebo onsite at the festival, which will be run in a similar way as the Newport Bus Station one.

This year the Festival Safe Space will be situated in the main public area and will be open from around 10:00 until 02:00 each day (except Thursday, which is open from around midday). This means the 90,000 festival goers/staff will be able to access it themselves instead of being referred to it like last year.

All foot patrols and the Safe Spaces will be happening from the Thursday to the Sunday (18th - 21st June).

Once again, this is a mammoth task for us so mainland street pastor volunteers will be joining us to help out.

The mainland volunteers cover the cost of their own travel with the option of camping onsite at the festival, camping at Miriam & Malc's or if they are unable to camp, then we find them a host house to stay at.

Organising has begun for this year's festival and as our Festival Safe Space will be on the main public area we need this to be manned the whole time that area is open and will also involve more kit being needed.

We started asking for donations earlier this year in order to make sure we have enough for the two safe spaces and the two areas of foot patrols.

This is the list of items that we are looking to be donated: -

- Individually wrapped sweets and lollipops
- Small bottles of water
- Wipes, tissues, small bottles of hand sanitizer, ice packs, paper cups

- Colouring sheets/books, crayons, colouring pencils, children's games
- We are also asking for financial donations towards other kit that the volunteers use.

The opportunity to show the love of Jesus at the festival, where 90,000 people attend each day, is amazing.

We are the only Christian organisation that are allowed to patrol on foot on the whole festival site.

If anyone would like to volunteer to cover shifts in either the Newport Bus Station Safe Space or the Festival Safe Space, please let me know. We had a few people last year volunteer who are not trained Street Pastors, help cover shifts alongside Street Pastors, which was amazing.

Added bonus to helping in the Festival Safe Space is you will receive a Festival Staff Wristband for free which gives you access to enjoy the festival site and stages when not on duty in the Safe Space, you will also get a staff parking permit for free, should you need it.

We also have a WhatsApp Prayer Group that will be live through the whole weekend, where we post prayer requests for people we meet, incidents we come across or dealing with etc. If you would like to join this, please let me know either on 07511 163632 or by e-mail on suzanne@iowstreetpastors.org.uk.

Open Church

In 2024, we set up a nativity scene and invited people to dress in Biblical costume and have their photo taken. Nobody came. On 6th December 2025, the same invite was combined with an Open Day and handed out to shoppers by shepherds roaming Shanklin town. Around 100 people came!



Whilst the others carried sheep, our largest shepherd, Leon, was deliberately given something the size of a newborn, which he tucked into his tunic – a novel take on ‘the lion and the lamb’.

On arrival, guests received a warm welcome and were offered a bag containing Christmas gifts. There were different ones for adults and children, and 50 were given out.

Several people dressed in costume to have their photo taken. This was done on their own device so there was no issue with Data Protection. An elderly man, with restricted mobility, was thrilled. He said he intended sending the photo to his daughter. He was accompanied by an Irish lady with dark hair and eyes. She said that, when she was at school, it was always a blond-haired blue-eyed girl that was chosen as Mary. She was delighted that we had a dark doll in the manger. We invited people to





email us their photo if they were happy for it to be used publicly. The father in the one below said they had only left the house to get their turkey from the butcher and never expected anything like this.

He told us that his children used to love coming to



our toddler group, CatURpillars, but they are now at school. When informed of the upcoming 'Messy Christmas' event, he said they would all be there. Children enjoyed deciding which costume their parents should wear, and invariably chose animals. Various families had adults dressed as a camel, a cow, or, as in this photo, a donkey.

Around 30 church members took it in turns to help, whether by setting up, clearing away, or during the time the church building was open to the public.

Free drinks and snacks

The Link - February 2026

were available from 10:30 to 14:30, with soup offered at lunch time. More and more chairs had to be added to the café style tables.

In addition to craft activities and toddler toys, a prayer tent was set up to which people could withdraw from the crowd, either by themselves or with prayer partners.



Christmas Messy Church took place two weeks later and a good crowd gathered to explore the Christmas story in craft, story and song. Brian pointed out that we even had a Gabriel playing Gabriel! He said: "A huge thank you to the team - especially to Yvonne who masterminds the craft and food. Great job again. Thanks also to those who came in to clear up at the end and help turn the place around for Sunday - really appreciated."

This was followed the next day by carol singers discussing the nativity. Keeping to the biblical

text, we saw the shepherds arriving to see a baby in a manger, and the magi presenting gifts to a toddler in a house.

Even after Christmas, Yvonne and Christopher continued the costumed fun during the All Age Service before New Year. Camels Camilla and Cameron carefully clomped down the aisle. The magi confidently came to Jerusalem, only to quickly find that the capital city was not correct. Because Cameron contracted Covid, they had to camp there (conspicuously keeping the regulation two metres apart) whilst he recovered. The camels discussed the continuation of their quest as soon as his clinical convalescence could be completed.



All these events definitely shone a light on the real meaning of Christmas.

Supporting North Korean Christians: interview with an Open Doors secret fieldworker

An Open Doors fieldworker, Lydia Lee*, shares what she sees in the North Korean church, and how you can be part of God's impossible plan.

What is life like for Christians in North Korea?

The church in North Korea looks nothing like churches in the rest of the world. Christians cannot gather openly, worship freely, or read the Bible without putting their lives at serious risk. Following Jesus in North Korea requires total commitment – a 100% dedication, even in the face of imprisonment, torture or death.

Because public worship is impossible, believers meet in secret, in very small and trusted groups. Often, it's an older family member who quietly shares the gospel and passes down biblical teachings to younger relatives. When a Bible is available, it is hidden – sometimes buried underground – and brought out occasionally so that people can read and memorise portions before it is hidden again. Possessing a Bible is considered a capital offence, so memorisation is a vital part of discipleship.

In addition to face-to-face sharing, some believers secretly listen to Christian radio broadcasts that are aired during the night. These programmes, produced by Open Doors fieldworkers, provide biblical teaching and encouragement. But accessing them requires an illegal, modified radio – another serious risk.

Despite these dangers, the underground church in North Korea is alive. It worships not with sound, but with whispered prayers and memorised Scripture. Believers continue to follow Christ with quiet courage, deep faith and a willingness to give everything for the sake of the gospel.

Why are North Korean Christians at risk?

The North Korean regime does not tolerate worship of anything other than the ruling Kim family. Followers of any faith face extreme risk. From early childhood, citizens are fed propaganda that portrays Christianity as dangerous, foreign and evil. Fabricated stories are circulated in schools and state media depicting American missionaries poisoning children or stealing their organs.

Many, especially those loyal to the regime, truly believe the propaganda and view Christians as enemies. Others don't necessarily believe it but, in a society built on fear and survival, might still betray them: reporting a Christian to the authorities can result in rewards like food, favour or social advancement.

Despite these dangers, the underground church in North Korea is alive. Most remarkably, some North Koreans have come to faith in Christ despite never hearing the gospel in a conventional way. Underground believers testify that God personally opened their hearts to the truth. Though deeply secret and often isolated, their quiet faith persists – demonstrating that, even under the harshest repression, the power of the gospel cannot be entirely silenced.

What has changed in North Korea in the past year?

The overall situation remains largely unchanged. North Korea has strengthened its military capabilities, indicating a continued emphasis on self-reliance.

Humanitarian conditions remain dire. Hunger and malnutrition continue to plague the population, leading to many deaths throughout the year. Daily life in North Korea is dominated by government control and political indoctrination. North Koreans endure a life shaped by scarcity, surveillance and fear – yet even in this repressive environment, people quietly care for their families, share what little they have, and find small ways to endure.

Why do North Koreans leave their country?

They may be disillusioned with the state, but the main reason they attempt to leave their country is simply survival for them and their families. During the 1990s and early 2000s, especially during the Arduous March – a period of famine and economic crisis – widespread starvation claimed the lives of millions. At that time, it was relatively easier to flee from North Korea, and many did it in search of food and safety.

Is it still easy to flee?

Escaping North Korea has become far more dangerous due to tightened border controls. They must use a large sum of money to ensure the guidance of a broker and to bribe border guards. Most people cannot afford it.

A more common method is to obtain a visa to visit relatives or to work in neighbouring countries. Many of these people overstay their visas because the limited time allowed is not enough to repay the debts they owe for their journey.

Unlike in the past, many people who leave North Korea today do so with the intention of returning. Staying in China or attempting the perilous journey to a third country like Thailand (and eventually to South Korea) is extremely risky and nearly impossible for most. Their decision to cross the border is usually driven by the dire conditions they face at home – poverty, hunger and lack of supplies.

How do Open Doors fieldworkers help?

There are safe houses and shelters near the border to reach and support them with basic necessities such as food, medicine and clothes. We offer thorough pastoral care, Bible training and special Bible studies for North Korean women who are trafficked near the border

Some of these believers may have opportunities to come back to our safe house for shelter and more biblical training. But for many others, the first visit could be their last chance to hear the gospel in their whole life. It is the very special and precious moment for our workers to share Jesus.

Some of the North Koreans we serve stay out of their home country long term; others plan to go back to support their families. They also bring the good news when they go back to the country.

What are the dangers of returning to North Korea?

The regime views defection as a serious crime. Any North Korean who is caught leaving or outside of the country is typically arrested and subjected to severe punishment, such as imprisonment in political or labour camps, torture, forced labour and sometimes execution.

Anyone who is caught endures a period of intense and brutal interrogation. North Korean officials ask prisoners who they talked to outside of the country, if they had contact with anyone and if they encountered Christians. This means Christians caught by authorities face an even harsher fate; they are often transferred directly to political labour camps without trial, where they have no chance of

release and effectively disappear from the outside world.

How can we pray for North Korean Christians?

Let us pray that God would give them both spiritual and physical strength: the endurance to remain faithful, and the courage to live boldly for Christ, even in the face of danger. Ask the Lord to strengthen their hearts with unshakeable peace, and to let their hidden faith burn like fire – alive, growing and unquenchable.

Pray that God would inspire, guide and teach North Korean believers as they quietly share the gospel with those around them. Ask that His Word would continue to spread in miraculous ways, even behind locked borders, and that many in North Korea would come to witness His love and power.

Let's also lift those who serve them – those who help North Korean believers and refugees outside of the country. Pray that God would fill them with wisdom, strength, comfort and the unmistakable presence of the Holy Spirit as they carry out their mission for His Kingdom. Pray that God would send us more faithful, humble and dedicated servants – those willing to go wherever God sends them, love those who are suffered, and carry the gospel with their lives.

Your prayers matter. God hears every word – not only for the North Korean church, but for all persecuted believers around the world. And the underground church in North Korea is deeply grateful for your support and faithful intercession.

Have you ever wondered what to do with the various plastic tubs containing chocolates, biscuits and sweets? Well, here is the answer!



Pub and brewery company Greene King is once again running 'Tub2Pub', a recycling campaign to raise money for Macmillan Cancer Support and to recycle plastics.

Crackdown on Christians in Yemen

14th January 2026

Christians in Yemen are facing an unprecedented crackdown as more than 50 believers have been arrested – and made to disappear – in 2026 already.

“We were waiting for some brothers who were coming to attend planned training,” says an Open Doors partner who works with Yemeni believers. “We do not know where they are and we cannot reach them.”

This is one of many similar stories that have taken place in the past couple of weeks. Christians in Yemen are facing an unprecedented crackdown by the Yemeni authorities. Since the beginning of 2026, the Yemeni church has witnessed a record number of arrest and imprisonments, with more than 50 people being taken into custody already.

Once detained, these believers effectively go missing.

Held without contact for weeks

Trusted sources suspect that the arrested will be held in secret locations for several weeks while they are being investigated and interrogated. We know from previous experiences that they are likely to be harshly interrogated with possible torture. During this time, family members do not receive any updates or information, and lawyers are not permitted to intervene. Prayer is the best and only means to have any influence over what is happening behind the closed doors of Yemeni police.

“Most of the people that I was always in contact with are now imprisoned,” shares an Open Doors partner. “Along with local Open Doors partners, those that we can still reach, we are trying to find ways to help. Pray for wisdom to avoid making the situation worse.”

Threats against Christians are circulating on social media and distributed as physical flyers. It seems that new alliances are joining forces to continue the crackdown on 'infidel' Christians across the country.

This crackdown is unusually ferocious, but these are threats that Yemeni believers have sadly long lived with. Yemen is number three on the Open Doors World Watch List, making it one of the most dangerous places in the world to follow Jesus. Choosing to convert to Christianity comes with the death penalty for apostasy, and believers can face death threats from their family and community, too.

Please pray

Although governing parties in this country place immense pressure on Christians, we pray that the Prince of Peace would grant His church in Yemen protection, wisdom and refuge amid the ongoing chaos. We pray that the authorities discover that Christians have no political agenda and are a blessing to the country rather than a threat.

Please join the Yemeni church in praying:

- That this aggressive wave would stop, and the prisoners are released immediately without any harm
- That every brother or sister that has been captured and taken into custody will find grace in the eyes of prison guards and interrogators, and that they will experience God with them in their most difficult moments
- For God to protect those that have not been captured, giving them courage and hope
- For God's peace to fill the hearts of those whose loved ones have been arrested, and that God would grant them the ability to forgive their persecutors
- That the church in Yemen will be strengthened during this time and not be crippled by fear. May our Lord give extraordinary power and bravery to His church in this time of sorrow to reflect God's love to those around them.

Lord God, please protect my brothers and sisters in Yemen. Thank You for their courageous faith – please give those who are imprisoned still deeper courage, strength and peace. May their loved

ones know Your sustaining comfort, and may the church in Yemen be a light in the darkness. In Jesus' name, amen. .

Yemen is No. 3 in the 2026 World Watch List

How are Christians persecuted in Yemen?

Christians in Yemen continue to endure a highly unstable condition of life, with threats from both authorities and family. Believers whose faith is discovered by their family could be forced into divorce or separated from their children.

Converts from Islam could face the death penalty for apostasy, creating an environment in which many feel forced to keep their faith secret. Islamist extremist groups attack Christian communities, meaning that if those who gather in secret are discovered, they face grave consequences.

Who is particularly vulnerable in Yemen?

In the south, fractured governance and Islamist extremist groups pose continuous threats to Christians. In the Houthi controlled north western regions, pressures are particularly severe – these areas are heavily policed, dissent is brutally repressed, and Christian converts who are discovered could face arrest and torture.

Christian women experience increased harsh treatment if their faith is exposed, including abuse, forced marriage and even so-called 'honour' killings, as Yemen's penal code grants leniency to perpetrators. Many feel spiritually isolated because of the repression they endure and their frequent inability to enjoy fellowship with others.

In the war-torn environment of Yemen, Christian men could be forcibly recruited into militias, some even as young as 13. If discovered, converts from Islam could lose their job, be imprisoned or even killed. Once taken from their families, their homes are especially vulnerable financially. Many Christian men choose to flee the country.
